



Richmond, Virginia

The following profile contains information on demographics, political figures, programs, crime, drug use, drug trafficking, and enforcement statistics.

Demographics

- Population: 194,729 (July 2003 Census estimate);¹ 197,790 (2000 Census)²
- Race/Ethnicity (2000 Census): 37.7% white; 56.9% black/African American; 0.2% American Indian/Alaska Native; 1.2% Asian; 0.0% Native Hawaiian/other Pacific Islander; 0.2% other race; 1.3% two or more races; 2.6% Hispanic/Latino (of any race)³

Crime and Drug-Related Crime

- During 2003, the Richmond Police Department reported 1,381 drug violations.¹⁶

- There were 41 adult arrests for murder in Richmond during 2003.¹⁷

- The Richmond Police Department made 874 adult arrests for drug violations during 2003.¹⁸

Drugs

- Cocaine
Law enforcement officials in Richmond report that powder and crack cocaine are readily available and rates of use are high.¹⁹ In the 4th quarter of FY 2002, powder cocaine sold for \$25,000-\$30,000/kilogram in Richmond. Crack cocaine sold for \$25,000/kilogram and \$20/rock.²⁰
- Heroin
Heroin is commonly abused in Richmond. South American heroin is widely available in the city.²¹
- Marijuana
In the 3rd and 4th quarters of FY 2002, commercial-grade marijuana sold for \$700-\$1,000/pound and \$100/ounce in Richmond.²²
- Club Drugs
The Drug Enforcement Administration Washington Division reports increased abuse of MDMA in Richmond. In the 4th quarter of FY 2002, MDMA sold for \$8-\$18/tablet wholesale and \$20-\$25/tablet retail.²³

Juveniles

- During the 2002-2003 school year, Richmond schools reported 48 incidents involving drug violations.²⁴ This is down from 59 drug incidents in the 2001-2002 school year.²⁵

Enforcement

- Narcotics Unit²⁶
This Richmond Police Department Narcotics Unit conducts major narcotic case investigations directed toward upper-level narcotics dealers and their organizations.
- Blue Wave²⁷
Created in 2002, the Richmond Police Department Blue Wave initiative aims to improve the quality of life in Richmond through enforcement and community partnerships. The Blue Wave team is designed to provide visibility and quick response to neighborhood public safety issues.
- As of October 31, 2003, there were 765 full-time law enforcement employees in Richmond (632 officers and 133 civilians).²⁸

Trafficking and Seizures

- According to the DEA Richmond District Office, some young people from Richmond travel to the southwestern U.S. for methamphetamine and bring it back to sell in the local markets.²⁹

- The Richmond Police Department Narcotics Unit seized 3,142 hits of MDMA in 2002.³⁰

- From October 2002 to January 2003, the Richmond Police Department Blue Wave initiative seized 77 grams of drugs.³¹
- During 2002, the Richmond Police Department “Vanquish” unit seized 43 grams of marijuana, and 5.5 grams of crack cocaine.³²
- The Richmond Police Department Vice Unit seized 19.228 grams of drugs in 2002.³³

Courts

- Drug Courts³⁴

As of May 27, 2004, there was 1 drug court in Richmond that had been operating for more than 2 years and 2 drug courts that had recently been implemented. No additional drug courts were being planned.

Consequences of Use

- The number of deaths in which heroin was a factor in Richmond increased from 33 in 1999 to 44 in 2000.³⁵
